Roy Otto Schuetze, 97, of rural Froid, MT passed away February 13, 2013 at the Roosevelt Memorial Hospital in Culbertson, MT. He was born to parents Frank and Anna (Krumm) Schuetze in French, Minnesota on October 21, 1915. At 2 years of age, he traveled west with his parents to the Damm Community northeast of Culbertson, Montana to begin his life of farming and ranching. Life on the farm was long hours and hard work but Roy loved working the land with horses and early-day tractors. The family lived off the land with a large garden, chickens, turkeys, rabbits, pigs, and cattle to eat. Roy started milking cows at a young age providing milk for the family to drink and cream to sell. He attended the Damm School graduating from the eighth grade; his parents decided he was needed on the farm so high school was sacrificed for hands-on learning farming and ranching. Roy continued his contact with the Damm School carrying barrels of drinking water from the family well by horse drawn wagon for 25 cents a barrel. Roy's working with and learning from his parents on the farm continued into his 30's when he met the girl of his dreams, a rural school teacher, Viola Rudolph.

Roy and Viola were married in 1945 at Saint Anthony's Church in Culbertson, Montana. As they began their new life together it brought many changes to the small rural farm as children Shirley, Ronnie and Karen joined the family. The work load increased but the size of the farmstead home shrunk so Roy had carpenters build a new family home. Fifty-seven years later, it is still a beautiful modern farm home. The children learned about hard work, responsibility and respect on the farm just as Roy had from his dad and mom. Childhood duties included cleaning the cream separator, picking and cleaning the eggs for sale, weeding the garden, cultivating the potatoes on horseback, assigned house cleaning chores, haying and summer following, as the children were taught farm-life values.

Roy lost his loving wife and best friend, Viola, as she passed away Oct. 5, 1987. He continued working his land and watching the crops grow. It was not unusual to see his little red pickup parked along a country road as he walked into a grain field to check out the crop, Once the grandkids were all out of school the long winter days
