

Donna Louise Howard Haugen was born November 27, 1933 in Williston, North Dakota to Valera (Lowe) and John Howard. She was youngest of four children. Her family came to North Dakota from Pike County, Illinois and Howard County, Iowa.

Donna attended country grade school until the fifth grade where she completed fourth and fifth grade in one year. After the fifth grade, she and her sister, Eileen, lived at an apartment in Williston to attend school. Her father would bring them into town in a horse and sleigh on Mondays and fetch them

back to the farm after school on Friday's.

Donna had an impeccable work ethic. She was a licensed abstractor working for Bud McMaster at the Williams County Abstract Company. She worked on the original abstract for the first oil well in North Dakota, the Clarence Iverson No. 1. She also worked at the Vocational Rehab Center, as an independent landman, and ended her working years at the Williams County State's Attorney Office. Each of her work places she left behind many lifelong friends ... young and old.

Donna's faith was always very important to her. She was raised in the Catholic faith. She was a lifelong member of St Joseph's Catholic Church in Williston. As well as working full time, she was active in her children's extra-curricular activities whether being active in PTO at St Joseph's School or as a leader of her daughters' Blue Birds or Camp Fire Girls Troops. Donna seldom missed swim meets and often drove to out of town events including years of high school basketball, football, baseball, and wrestlettes. She was an honorary mom to all the cheerleaders. Her kitchen table was always open to any stray that her children brought home to the dinner table, including the youth minister at the local Baptist Church. She was also a lifelong member of the Catholic Daughters where she ultimately became president.

It was clear to all that Donna's passions in life was her family, whether it was long weekends at their cabin at Blacktail Dam, picnicking and swimming at Spring Lake Park, sledding trips to golf course hill, family vacations at Lake Metigoshe or teaching her kids to dance the Charleston, the jitterbug or the twist on the kitchen floor. She loved her community where she volunteered for many causes including UMARC, Right to Life, Altar Band, her church, her children's school and activities, but her most important passion was the love of her life. On June 10, 1952 Donna was united in marriage to Gilbert Terrill Haugen in Williston. They were married for over sixty one years.
