in useful ways,

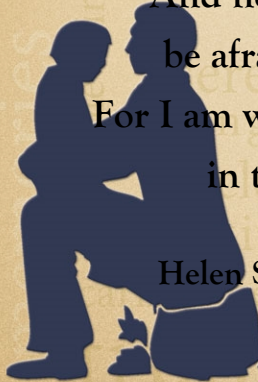
Reach out your hand

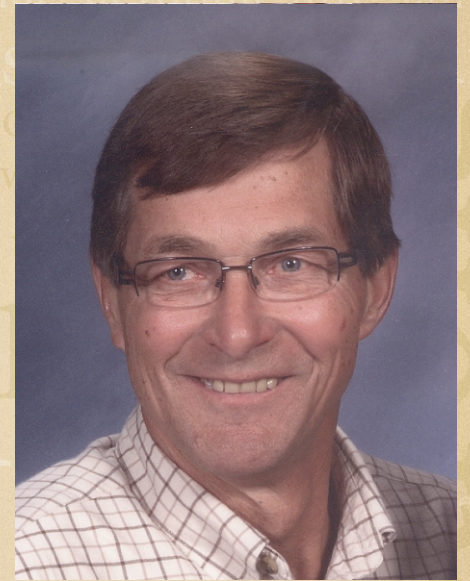
