On rare occasions even 3-day getaways to the Black Hills, which had been a favorite spot since Mom and Dad's honeymoon.

When the farming season ended, winter months were spent tending cattle and working on major home remodeling projects. Dad constantly strived to improve our lives. Even though farming was his passion and calling, Dad recognized the value of education and offered each of us kids the higher education of our choice.


