



Velma was born on January 15<sup>th</sup>, 1929, on the family farm in rural North Dakota to Albert and Esther Western. She attended school in James Hill Township completing her studies through through the 8<sup>th</sup> grade where she developed a lifetime love of reading. Thereafter, Velma went on to spend the late 1940's through the mid-1950's working domestically for a number of local families with duties ranging from housekeeping to childcare.
